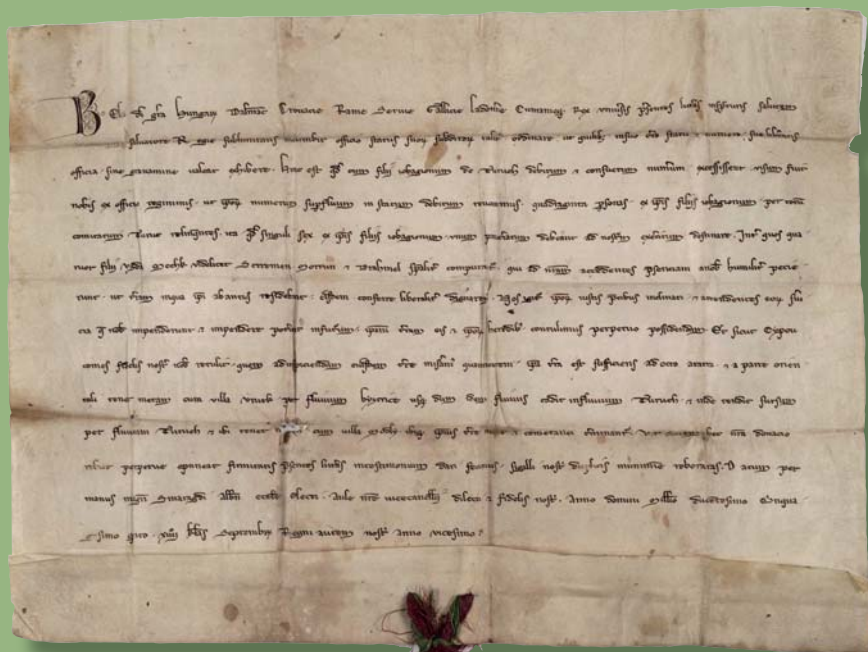


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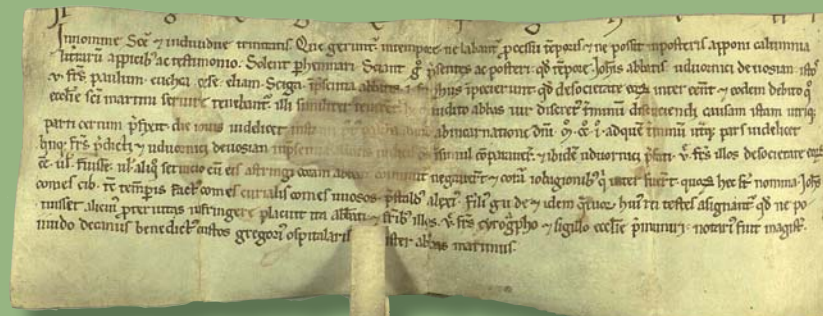

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An established network with several European archives, libraries and scientific institutions supply a continuous improvement and an extension of the inventory.

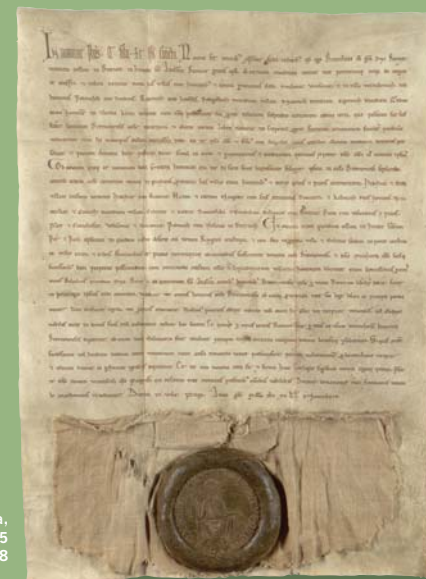
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Time and space are irrelevant: the documents are accessible free of charge around the clock in a rapid, unbureaucratic way – from anywhere in the world.
